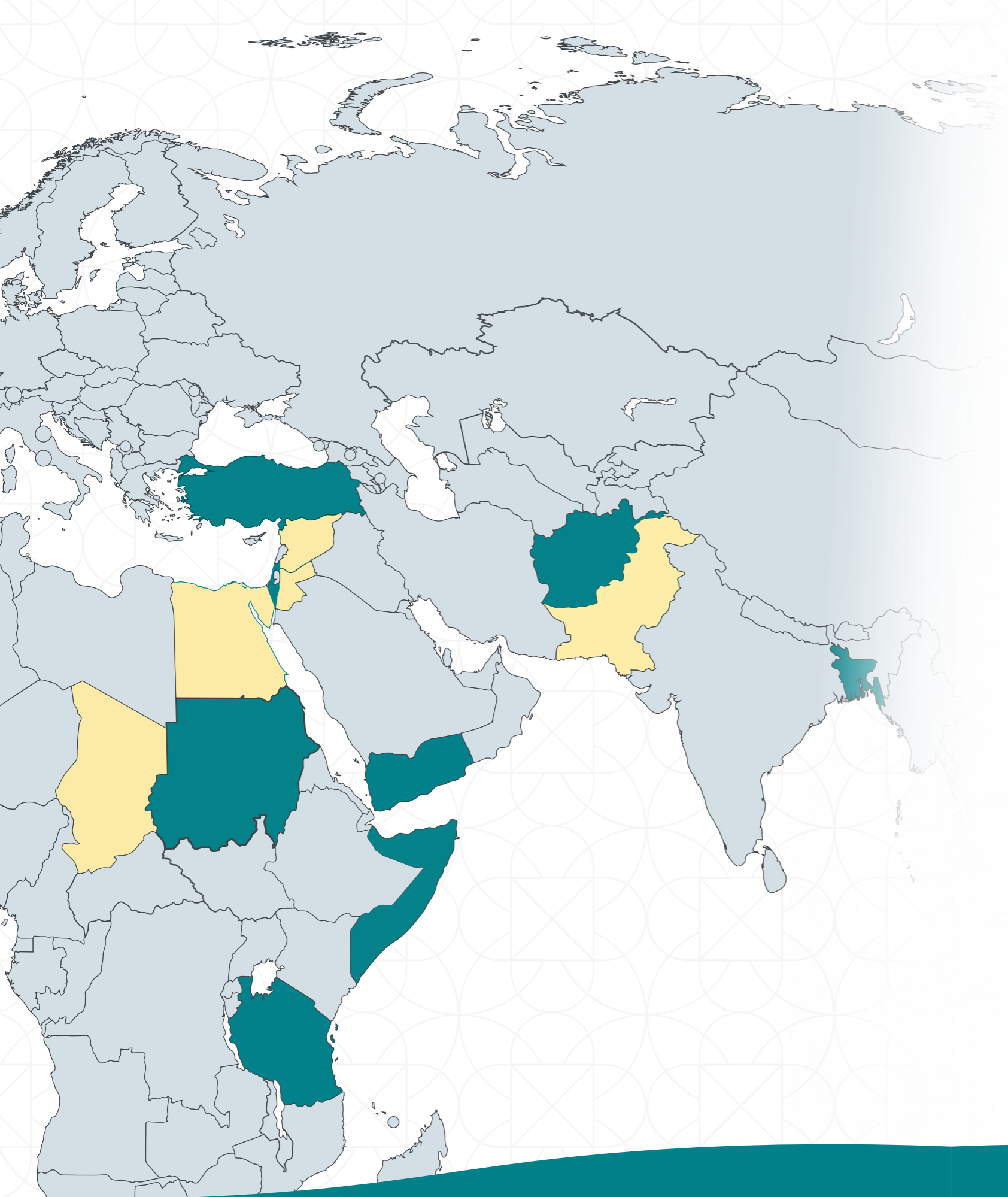
As an institution, within the scope of our Disaster and Emergency activities, we strive to meet the basic requirements of those in need through shelter, food, and hygiene assistance.

DISASTER- EMERGENCY

Palestine-Gaza Emergency Relief

In 2023, the war and deepening blockade in Gaza made it impossible for civilians to access basic life necessities. Approximately 1.9 million people—corresponding to 90% of the population—have been displaced and deprived of the most fundamental rights such as shelter, food, and clean water. The health infrastructure has suffered a heavy blow, with 84% of hospitals damaged, leaving only 55% of the total bed capacity functional. Especially in Northern Gaza, the risk of famine has reached its highest level, while the collapse of the education system and the deep psychological destruction have become elements threatening the future of society (OCHA, 2024; ReliefWeb, 2025).

The severe restriction of humanitarian aid access to the region, limitations at border crossings, and ongoing security threats have significantly complicated field operations. Field analyses prove that the vast majority of the population is experiencing deep crises in accessing shelter, food, clean water, and basic health services. In this context, international solidarity and coordinated response operations have become a critical necessity to alleviate the effects of the humanitarian destruction in Gaza.

As Islamic Help Türkiye (İslami Yardım Derneği), throughout 2025, vital projects such as cash assistance, hot meal distributions, hygiene kits, food parcels, clothing support, and sustainable access to clean water were carried out without interruption for civilians both inside Gaza and for Palestinians who took refuge in Egypt.

Somalia Emergency Relief

The historical roots of the deep-seated humanitarian crisis in Somalia are fundamentally linked to a long-standing process of political instability that began in 1991, the gradual weakening of state authority, and chronic armed conflicts that have persisted for decades. This fragile socio-political structure has recently taken on an even more severe dimension due to successive waves of drought, floods, and the outbreak of diseases, which were followed by sudden and irregular rainfall patterns. These environmental and conflict-related shocks have directly devastated the country's primary livelihoods, particularly agriculture and livestock, creating immense pressure on food security, access to clean water, and the provision of essential public services. Current field assessments indicate that approximately 9 million people in Somalia are directly affected by this multi-dimensional crisis, while around 47% of the total population is severely impacted by overlapping factors such as conflict, flooding, drought, epidemics, and forced displacement. In addition, an estimated 3.5 million people are currently living as Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) within the country. The main drivers of this mass displacement include escalating climate shocks and ongoing armed conflict (OCHA, Somalia 2025 Humanitarian Needs and Response Plan).



In order to address these critical humanitarian needs, Islamic Help Türkiye (İslami Yardım Derneği) has consistently implemented comprehensive aid activities aimed at improving the living conditions of the IDP population in Somalia. Within this framework, detailed field visits have been conducted to IDP camps located in strategic areas, primarily in Mogadishu and its surrounding regions. During these visits, technical feasibility studies and preliminary assessments were carefully carried out to identify basic needs directly on the ground. In addition, coordination was established with relevant local authorities, and official data regarding the current humanitarian situation and urgent needs was obtained. Based on all findings and field data collected throughout this process, strategic prioritization of intervention areas was carried out, and technical planning was developed to ensure that resources are allocated in the most efficient and effective manner.

Pakistan Disaster and Emergency Relief

In 2025, severe monsoon rains across the Punjab, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and Sindh regions of Pakistan triggered catastrophic flooding with devastating humanitarian consequences. These extreme weather events directly affected approximately 6 million people, leading to the displacement of 2.5 million individuals who lost their homes and livelihoods. The destruction of critical infrastructure, including roads and bridges, significantly hindered access to clean water and sanitation, further escalating the risk of waterborne diseases in the affected areas.

In response to the urgent needs identified by our field assessments, Islamic Help Türkiye (İslami Yardım Derneği) launched an extensive relief operation. We prioritized the distribution of essential food parcels, hot meals, and hygiene kits to the most vulnerable communities. Our humanitarian aid efforts focused particularly on providing sustained support to high-risk groups, including children, women, and the elderly, to ensure their basic needs were met during this difficult recovery period.

Afghanistan Disaster and Emergency Relief

In November 2025, a 6.3 magnitude earthquake struck the northern regions of Afghanistan, causing a severe humanitarian crisis across a wide geographical area, particularly in the provinces of Samangan, Balkh, Baghlan, Jawzjan, Kunduz, and Sarepul. The epicenter of the earthquake was identified near the Khulm district of Samangan province, approximately 30 kilometers east-southeast of Mazar-i-Sharif. According to the latest reports published by OCHA and local sources, the earthquake resulted in 26 fatalities and more than 1,000 injuries. The disaster, combined with harsh winter conditions in the region, further exacerbated already fragile living conditions, pushing the need for emergency shelter and urgent medical assistance to a critical level.

Immediately after the earthquake, emergency response activities were launched in a coordinated manner in line with international humanitarian standards, ensuring that priority needs were rapidly addressed. The operations carried out by our field teams not only enabled the direct delivery of life-saving assistance, but also supported affected communities in coping with the impact of the crisis and transitioning toward recovery and normalization. The interventions implemented in this context contributed in a multi-dimensional way to the restoration of humanitarian safety in the region and to the improvement of severely disrupted living conditions. Throughout the process, operations were carried out with consideration of local dynamics, ensuring that aid was delivered safely even to the most remote areas.

Sudan Emergency Relief

Sudan is currently facing one of the world’s most severe and complex humanitarian crises. The historical background of this ongoing crisis is rooted in the political transition process that gained momentum in 2018. In the period that followed, chronic institutional weakness, political disagreements, and escalating armed tensions have pushed national fragility to an extreme level, particularly deepening humanitarian needs in El Fasher and surrounding areas. The ongoing conflict environment has significantly increased mass displacement, severe restrictions on access to basic public services, and the risk of food insecurity. According to the latest United Nations data, more than 11.7 million people have been displaced across the country, while approximately 4.2 million people have been forced to seek refuge in neighboring countries. In El Fasher alone, around 650,000 people have been displaced, while in Tawila, approximately 1.4 million people are currently residing, including previously displaced populations. Local authorities are unable to adequately meet the needs of both host communities and newly displaced populations. In this context, urgent needs in health, nutrition, water, and sanitation (WASH) sectors remain critical and ongoing (OCHA, 2025).



Within this framework, comprehensive humanitarian assistance activities have been implemented in strategically identified areas most affected by the crisis in Sudan. These activities have included the distribution of essential food parcels and basic relief items, with the aim of alleviating the immediate impact of the crisis. In addition, cross-border humanitarian assistance projects have been carried out for Sudanese refugees who have sought safety in neighbouring Chad, where food and basic shelter materials have been delivered to refugee populations living in border camps under extremely difficult conditions. All of these interventions have been planned based on detailed field-based needs assessments and data analysis conducted by our professional field teams. The implementation processes have been carried out in full compliance with international humanitarian standards, ensuring that assistance is delivered effectively, systematically, and to the most vulnerable populations.

SEASONAL

Winter Relief

The winter months across Syria and Türkiye pose critical risks to vulnerable communities due to long-standing humanitarian fragilities and harsh climatic conditions. Particularly within Syria, mass displacement, inadequate housing, and the deepening economic crisis severely restrict access to fundamental needs such as heating, food, and clothing during the winter period. According to field assessments and current humanitarian reports, it has been determined that approximately 2.7 million people require urgent humanitarian support to survive the freezing effects of the winter season. In this challenging process, fully meeting the winter supplies and fuel needs of families struggling to survive in makeshift shelters constitutes a vital necessity to protect the health of children under inadequate infrastructure conditions and to permanently prevent a larger-scale humanitarian catastrophe likely to occur in the region. As freezing cold waves strain existing shelter capacities, it is of critical importance to urgently expand the scope of humanitarian aid operations, strengthen logistical networks, and optimize stock management (United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees – September 2023).



Within this scope, comprehensive winter relief activities were carried out across Syria and Türkiye throughout the 2025 winter period. Within the framework of these efforts, emergency life supplies such as fuel, winter clothing, and food parcels were delivered to households in need affected by harsh conditions. All these aid operations were planned by our professional field teams in line with meticulous needs assessments. During the distribution processes, priority was given to the most vulnerable and high-risk households facing freezing temperatures, ensuring the efficient use of resources. Our field operations have directly contributed to thousands of families spending the winter season in a safe and warm environment.

Ramadan Relief

Throughout the month of Ramadan, comprehensive humanitarian aid activities targeting vulnerable communities were carried out simultaneously in Türkiye and across many different geographies. Within the scope of these efforts, wide-scale iftar programs, food parcels containing essential nutrients, and distributions of Eid clothing for children were conducted. Through its programs in Türkiye, our organization focused on sensitive groups such as refugee families, low-income citizens, and individuals with disabilities, aiming to meet basic needs and reinforce social solidarity throughout Ramadan. These aid activities, planned by taking local sensitivities into account, provided not only material support but also served as a means to strengthen the bonds of brotherhood on a global scale.

Within the scope of Ramadan relief, activities were carried out in Syria, Somalia, Egypt, Palestine-Gaza, Yemen, Tanzania, Jordan, and Pakistan. Through these programs, our organization enabled millions of people to access iftar meals, provided essential food supplies, and supported families with Eid clothing. Operations were delivered to the most remote locations through the dedicated work of our field teams; thanks to these efforts, the abundance of Ramadan was brought to saddened hearts in crisis regions. The coordination established with local partners made it possible to deliver aid to those in need in the fastest and most accurate manner.

Wajib / Nafilah Qurbani Relief

Qurbani relief efforts were carried out to support the food security of families in need and to meet their nutritional requirements. In various regions of the world, many families face significant difficulties in accessing Qurbani meat due to poverty, conflicts, climate crises, and economic hardships. In this framework, the Qurbani aid provided not only contributed to meeting fundamental nutritional needs but also reinforced the sense of social solidarity and mutual assistance. Furthermore, these activities offered significant contributions to the development of global brotherhood awareness through the strong bridges of the heart established between different geographies.

Wajib and Nafilah Qurbani operations were carried out in Tanzania, Pakistan, Egypt (for Palestinian refugees), Syria, Chad and Somalia. All slaughtering processes were meticulously planned and implemented in strict accordance with Islamic principles. Especially during the Wajib Qurbani period, our expert teams deployed from Türkiye personally accompanied and supervised the slaughtering and distribution activities on the ground to oversee the entire process.



Following the completion of the Qurbani operations, visual and written updates regarding the slaughtering process were shared transparently with all shareowners. The Qurbani meat was primarily delivered to families in need who are struggling to survive in impoverished, crisis-affected, and hard-to-reach areas. The distribution process was completed in full under the careful supervision of our professional field teams to ensure that donors' amanah were delivered to the most appropriate recipients..

HEALTH

Mogadishu Mother and Child Health Center

Mother and child health clinic activities carried out in Somalia have filled a critical gap in a region where access to healthcare services is extremely limited. In the country, four out of every 100 children lose their lives within the first month, eight before reaching the age of one, and one out of every eight children dies before reaching the age of five; furthermore, one out of every 20 women dies due to complications related to pregnancy or childbirth (UNICEF Somalia, Health – Every child has the right to survive and thrive, 2024). This high-risk environment demonstrates how vital access to basic healthcare services is. Within this framework, the clinic has offered a free and comprehensive service model to increase the survival chances of mothers and children in the region.

A total of 4,209 people benefited from clinic services during the August–September 2025 period. In the clinic, 1,401 laboratory tests, 1,171 vaccinations, 15 referrals, and 14 birth services were performed. Providing healthcare services in such an integrated structure has played a critical role in preventing prematurity, infections, and birth complications, which cause more than 80% of newborn deaths (UNICEF Somalia, 2024). At the same time, the clinic has enabled early intervention in life-threatening situations for mothers and children by referring cases requiring advanced treatment to appropriate centers.

Health Camps

Every year, at least 160 million patients worldwide are unable to receive treatment because they cannot access necessary surgical interventions, facing severe health risks as a result. International studies reveal that access to surgical services is critically inadequate, particularly in low- and middle-income countries. Surgical care is not only a life-saving intervention but also a fundamental healthcare component that strengthens the resilience of health systems, reduces complications, and enhances the overall quality of patient care. In this regard, providing specialist physician support through health camps in geographies where access to basic surgical services is limited stands out as a significant intervention model in global health.

To respond to this global need, a multi-disciplinary health camp was conducted in Mogadishu, the capital of Somalia, during August 2025. Within the scope of the camp, patient examinations and surgical interventions were performed in the fields of general surgery, ophthalmology, and basic diagnostic services. Simultaneously, theoretical and practical training programs were organized for local healthcare personnel to increase the sustainable capacity of the local health system.



In this context, the voluntary health camp conducted in Somalia in August in cooperation with TİKA aimed to provide comprehensive and free support in regions with limited access to healthcare services. During the camp, 286 examinations and 161 operations were performed in the branches of ENT (Ear, Nose, and Throat), plastic surgery, and dentistry; furthermore, training seminars were organized for a total of 200 participants (specialist doctors and medical students) in each branch.

Cataract Camps

According to World Health Organization (WHO) data, at least 2.2 billion people worldwide live with near or distant vision impairment; for approximately 1 billion of these individuals, the condition is either preventable or has not yet been addressed (WHO, 2023). The leading causes of vision impairment include refractive errors and cataracts. Especially in low- and middle-income countries, untreated cataracts remain one of the most common causes of vision loss; globally, only 17% of individuals suffering from cataract-related vision impairment have access to appropriate surgical intervention (WHO, 2023). Untreated vision loss can lead to social isolation and loss of employment in adults, while causing learning and cognitive development issues in children. This situation not only reduces the quality of life for individuals but also hinders societal productivity, leading to significant economic burdens on a global scale.



Within the scope of cataract camps conducted in Syria and Tanzania, comprehensive screening, surgery, and treatment support services were provided to those in need who lacked access to medical care. During the camp process, eye screenings were performed to identify individuals with cataract complaints, and surgery lists were created for eligible patients. Prior to surgery, necessary tests were conducted to evaluate patients' surgical suitability; those with no contraindications for surgery were operated on according to the planned schedule. Following their operations, patients were discharged on the same day; prior to discharge, necessary eye drops, antibiotic medications, and protective sunglasses were provided free of charge. Thanks to these medical activities, hundreds of individuals who regained their vision have found the opportunity to continue their daily lives in a healthy and independent manner.

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

Mogadishu Orphanage Restoration

The long-standing conflicts, climate-induced disasters, and chronic poverty in Somalia have severe humanitarian consequences, particularly for orphaned and vulnerable children. According to UNICEF, as of 2024, 8.3 million people in the country are in need of humanitarian aid, and 5.1 million of this population are children (UNICEF HAC Somalia 2024). The same report states that 1.5 million children are at risk of acute malnutrition, with 330,630 children falling into the category of severe acute malnutrition. Due to ongoing drought, floods, and security issues, 3.8 million people have been displaced; this situation has dramatically increased children's needs for shelter, protection, education, and psychosocial support. Furthermore, independent reports indicate that orphanages in the country are struggling with overcapacity, and children face significant difficulties in accessing safe living spaces due to limited resources (Orphans in Need – Somalia Brief 2025). These data make the improvement of the physical conditions of orphanages a critical necessity.

In this context, the restoration work aimed at improving the living conditions of the Mama Ugasso Orphanage, which has been operational since 2018, has been successfully completed. Within the scope of the project, internal renovations of the building were carried out to create a safe and hygienic living space; new beds, linens, and other equipment were provided to meet the children's basic requirements. The center serves as an important protection mechanism that provides not only shelter but also rehabilitation, basic care, and psychosocial support. Through the restoration efforts, the housing standards of a total of 120 orphaned children have been raised; by improving the physical environment, both safety has been ensured and a living space suitable for the children's developmental needs has been created.

Gaza Orphan Sponsorship

According to UNICEF reports, at least 17,000 children in the Gaza Strip have been separated from their parents or orphaned; under the current unstable security conditions, this number is projected to be much higher. Many children who lost their families due to war face great difficulties in meeting basic needs such as shelter and nutrition and in holding onto life. This critical situation reveals the necessity of immediately implementing comprehensive support programs and sustainable aid projects to protect orphaned children and improve their living conditions.

The regular and sustainable support provided to 100 orphans in Gaza within the scope of the Orphan Sponsorship Project has ensured that the basic needs of the children are fully guaranteed. This holistic approach significantly contributes to the children's ability to sustain their lives under the negative conditions created by the war, their psychosocial development, and the protection of their access to basic human rights in a safe environment.

Water Wells

Many rural areas of Bangladesh face severe challenges in accessing clean and safe drinking water. Approximately 10% of the country's population still lacks access to a reliable water source. Water is of vital importance to the economy and culture of Bangladesh; agriculture, industry, and the livelihoods of millions of people depend directly on it. However, climate change, rapid population growth, and industrialization are seriously threatening the country's water security. The country is in a particularly vulnerable position due to rising temperatures, changing rainfall patterns, and rising sea levels.

The water well opened within the scope of this project aims to provide local communities with access to safe and regular drinking water. The project was implemented to both improve the quality of life of the people and strengthen agricultural productivity by supporting the efficient and sustainable use of water resources. This initiative aims to secure the basic needs of communities and improve living standards by providing a concrete solution to the water crisis in the region.

Hamam Türkmen Madrasah Restoration

The long-standing conflicts and security issues in Syria have significantly impacted children's right to education. In Tel Abyad and surrounding regions, the infrastructure of schools has been largely damaged, and essential facilities such as toilets, ablution areas, and kitchens have deteriorated. These deficiencies not only pose hygiene and security risks but also negatively affect students' regular attendance and learning processes. In the long term, educational environments with inadequate infrastructure can hinder children's physical and psychosocial development and limit their access to the right to education.

Through the restoration works carried out within the scope of the project, the center's basic facilities, including toilets, ablution areas, and kitchens, have been renovated and repaired. As a result, access to a healthy and safe educational environment has been ensured for a total of 120 children. With these improvements, the center has become a safe and sustainable educational space for the children in the region.
